Evelyn Rawski presents a revisionist history of early modern China in the context of northeast Asian geopolitics and global maritime trade. *Generals and Scholars* is the first work in English to examine fully military rule during the Koryo. Although it lasted for only a century, the period was one of dynamic change--a time of institutional development, social transformation, and the reassertion of the civil service examination and Confucian ideology coupled with the flowering of Zen Buddhism.
